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
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


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Artist Glimpse by Jean M. Perry: "George Stubbs (1724 –1806)"



Portraits and sculptures of horses have been popular from ancient times to modern, from before the Roman bronze sculpture of Marcus Aurelius, to the Bayeaux tapestry of 1088 which recorded the Battle of Hastings, to Durer's famous horse etching, to modern artist Leroy Neiman 's colorful action packed race horses. But one of the most celebrated painters of horses is George Stubbs. George Stubbs was born in Liverpool in 1724, the son of a successful tanner. He studied anatomy and painting at York Hospital. He was elected to the Royal Academy, but never received a diploma. Why?

Because he refused to submit a painting to them, which would have been similar to a thesis. Basically self-taught, George became an established por-

trait artist with aristocratic patrons. But, George preferred to pursue science! He disappeared for years at a farmhouse in

Lincolnshire, where he dissected horses and where his companion, Mary Spencer, was the only person who could stand the smell!!! George would dissect the animal layer by layer, for a better understanding of how it was made: inners, muscles, tendons, flesh, etc. The result was his incredible 1762 publication, "Anatomy of a Horse", which contained 18 masterfully engraved plates. The Medical Review of 1767 commented "We are at a loss whether most to admire the artist as a dissector or a painter of animals".




Veterinarians marvelled at the work. Other artists compared his work to Da Vinci's, who also dissected animals (and people!). Stubbs work was on the scale of Rubens! Stubbs historical masterpiece is still used today! And he dissected many other animals. He liked African animals, especially tigers. He also painted pets of his patrons.



About 25 years after these studies, George Stubbs returned to people and equine portraits. He painted the horse first, the background later. Sometimes no background was included, as in "Whistlejacket", where the power and beauty of the horse is accented. Some paintings included royalty, often presenting scandalous stories. "Laeticia, Lady Lade" is one of those stories. Have you ever heard the phrase "Lie, like Lady Lade"? Lady Lade was mistress to the aristocracy. Known for her notorious bad language (and career!), she was snubbed. She married Sir John Lade, a horse dealer. Here, she is pictured on her horse as the skilled rider and

adventurous woman that she was! But, for Stubbs, it was always about the horse: the beautiful coat and color, the proud face and head, the strong body. The beautiful animal! George Stubbs did marry and had one son. A prolific artist of the Romantic Move-
