Artist Glimpse by Jean Perry: "Thomas Nast (1840-1902)"



With elections around the corner, my mind wanders to Thomas Nast. We all know his cheerful portrayal of Santa Clause, but he also addressed issues of the times, especially political.

Thomas Nast was born in Landau, Bavaria in 1846. His family came to America when he was 6, settling in NYC. As a young man, he studied at the National Academy of Design. By age 15, Thomas Nast was an expert draftsman working for Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper. Within three years, he was working at New York Illustrated Newspaper, a job that sent him to England to cover a boxing match and then Garibaldi's Campaign in Italy. These events sparked Nast's interest in the American Civil War.

From 1862-1886, Thomas Nast worked as a cartoonist for Harper's Magazine. During the Civil War, he produced multiple images, patriotic and angry, against those shunning Lincoln's hope for freedom of all people. Lincoln complimented Nast regarding his patriotic scenes of the Civil War, acknowledging Nast as "our best recruiting sergeant".

But some of Nast's most recognized works were of the famous campaign against the "Tammany Ring" of the 1870's. The object of his satirical cartoons was "Boss" William Tweed (1823-1878) and his cohorts, whom he artistically described as ruthless criminals. As NYC alderman, Tweed gained influence in Tammany Hall. He assigned his political buddies to top positions in the city and controlled the Democratic Party in the city, all



while receiving kick- backs from contractors, corporations and paying off judges for favors. Elected to the state senate (1868), he became Tammany's grand leader, controlling the city, state patronage and treasury, stealing up to \$200 million!



In his 1871 wood engraving, "The Tammany Tiger Loose", Nast compares an event to an ancient, crowded coliseum. Here, we see a grossly obese Roman Emperor Tweed cheering a vicious huge tiger (a symbol of the Tammany Society, a political/social organization) mauling helpless gladiator, Columbia, who represents freedom. The tiger is a symbol of unchecked power. The caption reads Tweed's own words: "What are you going to do about it?" This cartoon, in particular, attracted the public eye and the ring was shortly afterwards broken. Tweed and his followers were imprisoned, but Tweed escaped to Cuba, then Spain. There, police identified him by Nast's cartoons! Nast became an American hero!

Nast originated the Republican Party elephant and popularized the Democratic donkey, both which have been used in presidential elections.

Nast moved his family to Villa Fontana, his home in Morristown in 1871. He continued to work in N.Y., and was very active in Morristown. He was an honorary member of the fire department and supported many charities.

By the 1870's and '80's, Nast expressed his concerns for the American poor and the growth of ant-Semitism and military growth in Germany. He also continued to criticize politicians he disliked. After leaving Harper's, Nast barely survived as a free-lance illustrator for several publications.

In 1902, President Theo Roosevelt awarded Nast for his service to the Republican Party by appointing him Consular to Ecuador, where Thomas Nast died of yellow fever six months later. But, a life well lived!
